Past Player/Current Coach Profile:

How old were you when you started skating? Why did you start?

I was 3 years old and started skating outdoors at Battle Creek Rec Center. My Dad bought skates for my brother Brent and me, and our older cousin spent some time with us on skating basics. After that, we were at the Rec Center as much as we could be, learning how to skate and play hockey. We developed a love for the game immediately.

Aldrich Arena. My Dad would take Brent and me there to watch Hill-Murray when we were younger. We were fortunate enough to play for Hill-Murray in the 90s and call that our home rink, and now I am enjoying watching my oldest son, Dylan, play for the Pioneers


in the same rink. That place holds a lot of special memories for our family.

As a competitor, you always play to win and the games were intense, but looking back on it years later your perspective changes and you appreciate the time your parents and volunteers put in to make the Selects tourney happen.

The hockey community is a great group, and I reconnect with a lot of guys when I go to my son's games. It seems that we all had kids around the same time, and it's fun to see old hockey buddies around the rink.

What is your overall favorite hockey memory?

It's either winning the State high school

championship with Hill-Murray in 1991, or watching Dylan's Hill-Murray team win it with his teammates in 2020. I can't choose one over the other; they were both very special. There is nothing like watching your child fulfill a dream!

Any advice for young players?

Be a good teammate. I've been fortunate enough to coach in the Woodbury youth program for several years and the wins and losses and goals and saves will stop at one point, but your character and reputation will live with you forever. The game of hockey reveals a lot about your character.

It's not an easy sport, but being a good teammate doesn't take a lot of talent.
