The event will feature 21 teams playing glow in the dark wiffle ball from 4:30-10:45 PM on the turf, at Greenheck Turner Community Center. The teams will be wearing neon clothing, and bases and bats will light up under the black lights. There will be a home run derby at 8:15 PM, for anyone to enter and concession stand food, face painting, raffles, 50/50, grid raffles, silent auction items and education sessions.

Listen to Luke & Brittney Bird speak about their son Bradyn. Hear about legislation, education, parental tips and resources. Bradyn was an exceptional student and athlete and loved to ski and play baseball. Members of his baseball team are leading the planning of this event as a way to honor his memory.

Bradyn M. Bohn, 15, passed away at his home on Wednesday, March 5, 2025, after being targeted for sextortion. His parents, along with the community, his teammates, the school, the city, the state and local officials want to make sure this NEVER happens to anyone, ever again.

What to wear?

Wear neon and high reflective clothing, hair accessories, glow paint, light up items and have fun!

What to expect?

Be flexible, this is our first event and it's a FUNdraiser. The event is free to attend with a goodwill donation. Bring a friend, neighbor, family and enjoy the evening. The first two sets of games will be played in the light. The second part of the night will be played in the dark, under black lights provided by In The Light. Heis Entertainment will provide DJ services and music for a dance party atmosphere while four games are played.

The Goal: To remember Bradyn, talk about him and raise money in his honor. This event takes place five days before his one year death anniversary. To educate community members about internet crimes against children and provide resources for parents and kids. Money raised at this event will be used to install lights at the new fields at Kennedy Park, the last place he played baseball, in his memory. DCE Youth Baseball will also designated money for a scholarship and ongoing education, in his honor, another way to keep his memory alive.
