(CIHA) Locker Room Policy

In addition to the development of our hockey players and enjoyment of the sport of hockey, the safety and protection of our participants is central to CIHA's goals. CIHA adheres to USA Hockey's SafeSport Program as a means to help protect its participants from physical abuse, sexual abuse, and other types of misconduct, including emotional abuse, bullying, threats, harassment, and hazing. To help prevent abuse or misconduct from occurring in our locker rooms, CIHA has adopted the following locker room policy. This policy is designed to maintain personal privacy as well as to reduce the risk of misconduct in locker rooms.

At the Isanti County Area David C. Johnson Civic Arena, there are multiple locker rooms available for CIHA's use. Some teams in our program may also occasionally or regularly travel to play games at other arenas, and those locker rooms, restrooms, and facilities will vary from location to location. CIHA team organizers will attempt to provide information on the locker room facilities in advance of games away from our home arena. At arenas for which you are unfamiliar, parents should plan to have extra time and some flexibility in making arrangements for their child to dress and undress, if desired.

Locker Room Monitoring

CIHA has predictable and limited use of locker rooms and changing areas (30 minutes before any team event and following practices and games). This allows for direct and regular monitoring of locker room areas. If the coaches or voluntary locker room monitors are not inside the locker rooms, **NO PLAYERS ARE ALLOWED IN THE LOCKER ROOM.** Either a coach or voluntary locker room monitors (each of whom has been screened & has received approval from the CIHA Registrar) will be posted directly **inside** of the locker rooms and changing areas during periods of use, and leave the doors open only when adequate privacy is still possible, so that only participants (coaches and players), and approved team personnel are permitted in the locker room.

Parents in Locker Rooms

Except for players at the youngest age groups (Mites/8U ONLY), parents are not allowed to enter locker rooms unless it is truly necessary. If a player needs assistance with his or her uniform or gear, if the player is or may be injured, or a player's disability warrants assistance, then we ask that parents let the coach know beforehand that they will be helping the player, and work with the coach to designate alternate plans. We encourage parents to teach their players as young as possible how to get dressed so that players will learn as early as possible how to get dressed independently.

Mixed Gender Teams

Some of our teams consist of both male and female players. It is important that the privacy rights of all of our players are given consideration and appropriate arrangements made. Where possible, CIHA will have male and female players dress/undress in separate locker rooms and then convene in a single locker room before the game or team meeting. Due to a number of possible reasons, arriving to any facility dressed in a base layer is highly encouraged for all teams. Base layers are a **requirement** for Co-Ed teams, and on skills nights of any kind, or when an opportunity of mixed locker rooms can occur. Bare skin from t-shirt and shorts are accepted but players in the above scenarios are not allowed to go down to undergarments. Once the game or practice is finished, the players may come to one locker room for a team meeting and then proceed to separate locker rooms to undress and shower, if available.

Cell Phones and Other Mobile Recording Devices

Cell phones and other mobile devices with recording capabilities, including voice recording, still cameras, and video cameras, are not permitted in the locker rooms. This rule includes all Mite/8U teams, players, parents, and volunteers. If phones or other mobile devices must be used, they should be taken outside of these areas.

Prohibited Conduct and Reporting

CIHA prohibits all types of physical abuse, sexual abuse, emotional abuse, bullying, threats, harassment, and hazing, all as described in the USA Hockey SafeSport Handbook. Participants, employees, or volunteers in CIHA may be subject to disciplinary action for violation of these locker room policies or for engaging in any misconduct or abuse that violates the USA Hockey SafeSport Policies. This includes being subject to the CIHA Parent and/or Player Code of Conduct.

Player Participation Requirement

No player will be allowed to practice, play, or participate in any other team activities until the acknowledgment form is signed by both the player and at least one parent/guardian, and returned to CIHA.
